Required Minor: Students pursuing a B.A. in German must also minor in another field. Popular choices are other languages, business-related fields, Art, and History. Please note that if a student is already majoring in another field, this requirement does not apply. Students may be allowed to substitute other courses for the requirements listed above. Often, this will occur when a student chooses to participate in a study abroad program, when special one-time course is offered, or when a motivated student chooses to pursue an independent study or capstone project with a program faculty member.	
German B.S. in Teaching	
Additional Courses: Students pursuing a German B.S. in Teaching are required to take four teaching methods courses taught by Department of World Languages and Cultures faculty. These courses provide instruction in both the theoretical framework and practical implementation of language instruction and acquisition in the classroom. WLC 460 Methods of Teaching Modern Language WLC 461 Applied Modern Language Teaching Methods WLC 462 Foreign Language Elementary School (FLES) Methods WLC 463 Applied FLES Methods	Additional Requirements: While there is no required minor, students are required to complete additional courses in the College of Education for K-12 licensure. Students selecting this option must also demonstrate an intermediate high level speaking proficiency as defined in the ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines established by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages or their equivalent. Firsthand experiences in relevant target cultures are also required.
