Global Education at Minnesota State University, Mankato (MNSU) is comprised of the Office of the Dean, the Kearney International Center, the Center for Global Engagement, and the Center for English Language Programs. Collectively these areas are responsible for planning, coordinating, and delivering the principal aspects of the University's international education efforts and global endeavors. These endeavors include the recruitment and retention of international students, development and coordination of education abroad and away programs, promotion of and support for faculty and student exchange opportunities, implementation and management of international partnership initiatives and agreements, and oversight and monitoring of the institution's compliance with all federal, state, and system requirements pertaining to international education.

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STUDENT ENROLLMENTS: FALL 2022

Minnesota State University, Mankato moved from **12th to 9th** nationally in international student population among master's institutions, according to the 2022 annual "Open Doors Report".

Fall 2022 enrollment was up by **8.4%** seeing growth in retaining graduate and undergraduate students, as well as New Entering Freshmen (NEFs).



INTERNATIONAL TRAVEL

Global Education assists the Provost's Office to track all out-of-state and international university travel requests. There were 208 approved out-of-state university travel requests in 2022-2023 (as of June 1, 2023). Of these 62 were domestic out of state travel and 146 were international travel.


Travel by faculty accounted for 91% of university-sanctioned international travel. The most frequent purpose for all university travel (out of state and international) was overwhelmingly Conferences. 63% of Conference-travel was international and 37% was domestic. International research was conducted in the UK, Nepal, Germany, Australia, Canada, Singapore, South Africa, and Austria.

Employees traveled to 46 countries, with most frequently visited countries being Canada, Ireland, Belize, and Spain.

Of international travel conducted by faculty in Academic Colleges, CHSS sent the most faculty out on international travel.

ACE INTERNATIONALIZATION LAB

Global Education completed its participation in an 18-month campus-wide self-study and planning process that was undertaken from Fall 2021 to Spring 2023 as part of the American Council of Education Internationalization Lab. The self-study was designed to serve as an environmental scan for the creation of the Global Education Strategic Plan 2030 that will be initiated in the fall of 2023. We have prepared a report elsewhere on the outcomes of the Lab and are currently waiting for a formal ACE peer-review report.

Below is a summary of the thirteen recommendations for comprehensive internationalization at MNSU that emerged from the work across four workgroups and engagements with a wide spectrum of stakeholders as part of the project.

Faculty/Staff Globalization Efforts

- 1. Strategies for globalizing curriculum
- 2. Connect interdisciplinary focus, research, and DEI into Study Abroad Experiences
- 3. Professional Development/Supports for Faculty/Staff
 - a. Curriculum development and experiential learning
 - b. Creating successful faculty-led programs
- 4. Supporting Faculty-International Student Working Relationships

Students (international and students involved in education abroad/away)

- 5. Improve international transfer process
- 6. Improve retention through partnerships with offices on campus for resources and through clear academic pathways
- 7. Create merit-based scholarships and offer financial literacy education for international students
- 8. Onboarding of international students
- 9. Expand access to education abroad/away

Build Infrastructure and Capacity

- 10. Effective communication re: opportunities and stakeholder global activities
- 11. Improved processes to access information on available opportunities (e.g., Fulbright, international sabbatical, globally focused high impact practices, etc)
- 12. Consider campus members as a resource for internationalization
 - a. Recruitment of International Students
 - b. As Cultural Capital
- 13. Maximize Partnerships

RECRUITMENT TRAVEL

Kearney International Center prioritized in-person recruitment travel throughout the year. Their main goals for in-person travel this year were to revitalize transfer pathways, partnerships with foreign universities, and agreements with governmental, non-governmental, and private sector entities. KIC staff traveled to the following locations:



Visits in each one of the countries focused on in-person visits to high school partners, potential university partners and contracted agents. KIC visits are crucial to build providing accurate information to our agent network, teaching and advising prospective students on the reality of a U.S. education and visa process. KIC staff evaluates whether high schools, agents or institutions are following ethical advising practices and are effective partners for Minnesota State University, Mankato.

KIC recruitment staff proposed a yearly travel budget of \$92,700 (\$49,510 for Fall 2022; \$43,190 for Spring 2023). The Center for English Language Programs supplemented the Kearney International Center's travel budget by sponsoring the Taiwanese recruitment travel (\$10,040). SUPPORTING INTERNATIONAL STUDENT INTERNSHIPS



Kearney International Center participated in the Career Expo as available resources for international students and employers about Curricular Practical Training, Optional Practical Training and more. KIC also presented for GreenSeam to local employers highlighting the international talent on the MNSU campus and the opportunities for local businesses to hire interns and employees. KIC developed a partnership with Attorney Erin Schutte Wadzinski from Kivu Law and Katie Hodgen in the Career Development Center to provide a free webinar "Hiring International Mavericks – What Employers Should Know" for nearly 100 employers in southern Minnesota.

KIC met with the Construction Management, Mechanical and Civil Engineering, Computer and Information Systems departments to discuss internships/CPT/Co-op requirements and opportunities specifically relevant to those programs and curricula. These connections have increased student and department awareness of F-1 employment rules, regulations and opportunities.

The Kearney International Center also presented to the Graduate Program Coordinators providing an overview of KIC, the lifecycle of an international student from prospect to alum.

SCHOLARSHIP, GRANTS AND FUNDRAISING

60+ applications were received for the Gladys Olson International Student Endowed Scholarship. 13 awards totaling \$45,500 were identified for the next academic year and one \$1,500 award for the Zainul Abedeen Scholarship.

\$95,000 in International Student Emergency Assistance grants were awarded to 95 students over the academic year.

The Kearney International Center ran a crowdfunding campaign with the goal to bring awareness to students in financial crisis applying for various off-campus employment authorizations. The \$410 application fee is challenging and the KIC was able to raise \$2,270 in funds to support a little more than five applications. The Wynn and Ginnette Kearney Foundation generously donated \$25,000 to the International Student Program foundation account which was also used to support ten applications for off-campus employment due to severe economic hardship.



GLOBAL EDUCATION ADVISORY COUNCIL (GEAC)



The Global Education Advisory Council meets monthly to advise Global Education in its global experiential learning activities. It provides recommendations and promotes global opportunities across the campus. In addition, GEAC serves "as stewards of the global education strategic plan through internationalizing curriculum, program development, strategized recruitment, thoughtful partnership development, mobilization of students, staff and faculty and retention initiatives."
