#2: Thursday, January 23rd, 2 - 4 p.m. — Common GI Issues as We Age and How to Prevent Them

Common GI issues when we get older may include GI-related tumors (e.g., colorectal neoplasms) and functional GI disorders such as gastro esophageal reflux, indigestion, constipation, and fecal incontinence. Dr. Wang will provide an overview of these issues and discuss how to manage or prevent them.

Presenter: Ming-Hsi Wang, M.D., Ph.D. is an Associate Professor of Medicine, Mayo Clinic College of Medicine, Rochester, Minnesota. He is also Consultant, Division of Gastroenterology & Hepatology, Mayo Clinic Health System, Mankato. He has published numerous studies on inflammatory bowel disease.

#3: Saturday, February 1st, 12:30 – 4:30 p.m. — Securing Freedom: A Screening and Discussion of Spielberg’s Lincoln

February 1, 2025, is the 165th anniversary of the passage of the 13th Amendment abolishing slavery. Join us for a screening of Steven Spielberg's acclaimed 2012 film "Lincoln" which tells the inside story of how Lincoln worked tirelessly to accomplish that during his final few months in office. Daniel Day-Lewis won an Oscar for his portrayal of Lincoln. After the movie we'll have a discussion, led by local Lincoln scholar Bryce Stenzel with an assist from Steve Gilbert, about the film's portrayal of historical events, the political challenges of passing the amendment, and the enduring impact of Lincoln's leadership. This event is a meaningful opportunity to reflect on one of the most pivotal moments in American history and its relevance today.

Presenter: Bryce Stenzel is a well-known Mankato historian and teacher; he has portrayed Abraham Lincoln for years both locally and nationally.

#4: Monday, February 3rd, 2-4 p.m. Empowering Connections: Communication Strategies for Stroke, ALS, and Beyond (This is a ZOOM Presentation)

Stroke, ALS, cerebral palsy, autism and other medical conditions can isolate their victims and partially or totally eliminate their ability to speak. However, innovative technologies are being developed right here in Minnesota to help individuals regain their voice — their *own* voice. Prof. Hyppa-Martin will tell us about UMD's ground-breaking work in this area, including computerized "voice-banking" and eye- and head-controlled speech devices. These advanced technologies are on the cusp of augmenting long-standing practical tools and enabling patients to continue to speak in their own voice, stay socially connected and maintain independence. If you are interested in cutting-edge science and medicine, this talk is for you.

Presenter: Jolene Hyppa-Martin, PhD, CCC-SLP, is an Associate Professor in Communication Sciences and Disorders at the University of Minnesota Duluth where she directs the Augmenting Language Lab, teaches, and supervises graduate students at the Robert F. Pierce Clinic. Her pioneering work has been featured in local media, Minnesota Public Radio, and peer reviewed journals. Her specialty is Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC), i.e. methods, tools, and strategies used to support or replace spoken or written communication for individuals with severe speech or language impairments.

#5: Tuesday, February 11th, 1 - 3 p.m.— Not the Camilla We Knew: One Woman's Life from Small-town America to the Symbionese Liberation Army

How did Camilla Hall, a small-town Minnesota pastor's daughter, became one of the most wanted domestic terrorists in the U.S and die in a 1974 shoot-out with LA Police? Through in-depth research and extensive interviews, author Rachel Hanel has sensitively pieced together Camilla's bewildering transformation from a gentle young woman working for social change within the system, into a gun-wielding criminal involved in the kidnapping of Patty Hearst. Camilla Hall's story is of urgent interest for what it reveals about the forces of radicalization. As Hanel ventured ever further into Camilla's past, searching out the critical points where character and cause might intersect, her story became an intriguing, disturbing, and ultimately deeply moving journey into the dark side of America's promise.

Presenter: Rachael Hanel is a Professor of Creative Writing at MSUM and the author of "Not the Camilla We Knew: One Woman's Life from Small-town America to the Symbionese Liberation Army", University of Minnesota Press, 2022.

**#8: Tuesday, March 11th, 2 - 4 p.m. — DIY: The Wonderfully Weird History and Science of Masturbation
(This is a ZOOM Presentation)**

MSU Professor Eric Sprankle will take us on a humorous deep dive into the untold story of crusaders on a campaign to suppress masturbation, sex educators fighting back, and everyday people stuck in the middle who just want to touch their genitals in peace. Professor Sprankle will introduce us to a colorful cast of characters: doctors who advocate using chastity devices, wellness influencers who believe ejaculation depletes the body of vital nutrients, pastors who preach masturbation creates mermaids, and vibrator aficionados who teach the curious how to climax. This presentation will challenge what you think you know about the very human need for self-pleasure.

Presenter: Dr. Eric Sprankle is a professor of clinical psychology at Minnesota State University, Mankato. He received his doctorate in clinical psychology from Xavier University in 2009, completed a postdoctoral fellowship in sexual health at the University of Minnesota Medical School in 2011, and was awarded tenure in the psychology department at Minnesota State in 2017. He is the author of the recently published book, *DIY: The Wonderfully Weird History and Science of Masturbation*.

#9: Tuesday, March 18th 2 - 4 p.m. - Famous Trials: The Scopes Trial, Bible vs Evolution

In March of 1925, the Tennessee Legislature banned the teaching of evolution in Tennessee public schools. A small town in the foothills of the Great Smoky Mountains would be the epicenter of a legal and cultural battle that summer. John Scopes, a substitute teacher and football coach, was charged with unlawfully teaching evolution to his students even though the school issued biology textbook had a chapter on evolution. William Jennings Bryan, three-time presidential candidate would prosecute John Scopes and defend the inerrancy of the Bible. The famed defense attorney Clarence Darrow defended Scopes and his First Amendment right to freedom of thought and speech. The trial would culminate in one of the greatest cross examinations in American Legal history.

Presenter: James Fleming practiced law in Minnesota for 35 years before his recent retirement, 22 of those years as a public defender. He served as the chief public defender for the 15 counties of the Fifth Judicial District in southwest Minnesota, based in Mankato, and later for the Second Judicial District (Ramsey County).

#10: Thursday, March 27th, 2 - 4 p.m. — Mankato's Hidden History of Racism

A review of property records in Mankato found neighborhoods having covenants and deeds prohibiting local properties from being transferred to non-white persons. A local cemetery also had racially restrictive covenants. Many of these restrictions were put into place as recently as the 1940s and 1950s. Learn about the efforts of the Mapping Mankato Project of Minnesota State University, Mankato to uncover this local legacy of racism.

Presenter: Dr. Angela Jill Cooley, Professor of History at Minnesota State University, Mankato is the team leader of the Mapping Mankato Project. Dr. Cooley specializes in the history of race and civil rights in the 20th century. Ph.D. in History from the University of Alabama, Juris Doctorate from George Washington University Law School, and two-year postdoctoral fellowship at the University of Mississippi's Center for the Study of Southern Culture.

#11: Monday, March 31st, 2 - 4 p.m.— Why Drug Courts Work

What does "work" mean? Does it mean it keeps people out of prison, provides effective treatment for substance abuse disorders, reduces crime, connects addicted law-violating addicts with recovery communities, and/or reduces the cost of justice system intervention? Regarding Drug Courts, the definition of "works" includes all of these. This session will review research along with personal stories from Minnesota Drug Courts about why Drug Courts are so effective.

Presenter: Barbara Carson, Professor Emeritus from MSU Mankato, has been a consultant and program evaluator for Drug Courts and Veterans Courts since 2006, serving in 15 different Minnesota counties. While at MSU she taught students how to be probation officers as well as how to work with victims of crime. She retired in 2019 as a Professor in Sociology and Corrections, and in 2023 relocated to Minneapolis to be closer to children and 4 grandchildren. However, she continues to work with several Drug and Veterans Courts.
